In celebration of our 30th anniversary, we asked some of the St John of God Foundation team to share their highlights.



Looking back over your time at St John of God Foundation, what are your biggest highlights?

There are so many - too many to mention them all here! I've had the immense privilege of seeing the real impact of community support for patients and their families. This impact is perfectly demonstrated through our Gifts of Hope program (created in 2019), which provides support for patients struggling with the cost of cancer treatment. Thanks to compassionate donor support, this program has helped countless people in our hospitals who may otherwise have not been able to access the best treatment for their cancer.

A major milestone that I feel particularly proud of was the refurbishment of the Murdoch Community Hospice, which was completed in 2021. Originally established over 25 years ago with support from generous donations, this vital service's renovation was entirely funded by donations and bequests from the community, showcasing the amazing kindness of our supporters.

I think both of these initiatives really speak to our values at St John of God Health Care, and how we emphasise compassionate care for patients and their loved ones during some of the most difficult times of their lives. I feel incredibly grateful and privileged to be part of a community where actual change and lasting impact is facilitated. Special kits support vulnerable patients

Being admitted to hospital can be a very confronting experience. Patients may feel scared and vulnerable, especially if they have an underlying cognitive impairment such as dementia, or if they are experiencing confusion as a result of the reason for their admission (for example, postoperative delirium).

It is important that caregivers are properly equipped to help patients remain calm and engaged in what can be an unfamiliar hospital environment, to minimise distress and ensure the best possible outcomes during their stay.

St John of God Subiaco
Hospital caregivers noticed
an increase in cognitively
impaired patients being
admitted to the hospital, and
recognised the need to take
extra steps to ensure these
patients were as comfortable
as possible.

Specialist Nurse Managers, Social Workers and Occupational Therapists worked together and came up with the idea to create special kits for cognitively impaired patients to use during their stay in the hospital, to offer calming distractions and also support the connection between caregivers and patients. The kits would include things like baby dolls, colouring books, fiddle activities, books, magazines, music, card games, weighted blankets and more.

Thanks to the support of our kind donors, these kits have become a reality.

Susanna Murphy, St John of God Subiaco Hospital's Performance Improvement Manager, says the kits are already helping patients and caregivers at the hospital.

"The kits are now used as part of our training program for patient care assistants and volunteers, who often sit with patients. The kits help to settle patients and caregivers may also use them to drive interactions that are meaningful and aid in reassuring the patient," says Susanna.

"One of the most successful items we are able to put in our cognitive impairment kits is the weighted blanket, which is scientifically proven to assist with calming, reassuring and managing anxiety in a variety of conditions including cognitive impairment."

Items such as the weighted blanket are single patient use only, which means these kits would not be possible without donor support.

"It was so wonderful to be able to share with the team that through the generous support of community donations we would be able to establish these kits and go the extra mile to support these patients and their families during a challenging time," says Susanna.

"I would love to say a huge thank you to all of the donors who have made these kits possible. Improving the care and experience for these extremely vulnerable patients is so meaningful and impactful. Please know the difference you have and will make and how grateful we are for your support."



Your support makes care closer to home a reality

St John of God Bunbury Hospital has recently completed a \$1.1M upgrade of its Interventional Cardiac Catheterisation Laboratory ('Cath Lab'), funded by generous donations.

The Cath Lab has been refurbished with a stateof-the-art Phillips Azurion 7 M20 FlexArm Angiography Machine. With more advanced imaging capabilities and staff positioning flexibility, the upgraded unit will improve treatment outcomes for both public and private patients in the South West.

Thanks to ongoing support from the local community, St John of God Bunbury Hospital's South West Coronary Care and Cancer Service can continue to provide stateof-the-art cardiac services. including interventional cardiology, cardiothoracic surgery, coronary care and cardiac rehabilitation for patients in the region.

St John of God Bunbury Hospital Chief Executive Officer Jeffrey Williams said the Cath Lab upgrade is part of the organisation's focus on ensuring patients have access to leading care close to home.

"The new angiography machine has brought the latest in hightech imaging to the South West community, with improved visualisation of structures in 2D and 3D it provides greater capabilities for cardiac and vascular procedures," Jeffrey said.

"Thank you to the generous St John of God Foundation donors who funded the upgrade to the Cath Lab, enabling us to provide state of the art care closer to home for the South West community."

Since it was first established in 2013, the St John of God Bunbury Hospital Cath Lab has performed a wide range of

open and minimally invasive procedures with excellent outcomes. Cardiologists and vascular surgeons in partnership with caregivers at St John of God Bunbury Hospital provide comprehensive care that ranges from treatments as simple as lifestyle changes, to performing cardiac stent insertions, pacemaker and defibrillator implants.

The support of local donors through St John of God Foundation has enabled the hospital to continue offering patients of the South West lifesaving equipment that was previously only available in the Perth metropolitan area.

We are truly grateful for the generosity of people like you, who continue to bring advanced treatments and compassionate care to patients and families at St John of God Bunbury Hospital. Your support means that the very best health care will be available closer to home for many years to come.

30 years of community support: Then... and now!

We asked some of our longest serving caregivers to tell us what fundraising has meant to them and their patients over the past 30 years.

I began working for St John of God Geelong Hospital around 1990, when I was moonlighting as a casual Registered Theatre Nurse in the operating theatre. After I had my children, it became my main place of work, and to me it felt like one big family - everyone was connected.

A girlfriend I worked with came to me one day and said we needed to raise money for a 'bear hugger', which was a piece of equipment used to keep patients warm and comfortable when coming out of theatre. We entered into a bike ride with a goal to raise \$3,000... and ended up raising considerably more!

A few years later, in 1994, St John of God Foundation was established. I didn't know much about it at the time, but I found myself looking around our hospital and noticing things that needed fixing or upgrading, and there always seemed to be a lack of funds.

I started working for the Foundation as the Community Development Manager, and we partnered with the Lighthouse Foundation to run a support service for vulnerable youth in Geelong. We raised funds to sustain the service through golf days, auctions, and sausage sizzles, and so on.

In 1999, the service became the first 'Horizon House' in Australia, which is now operated by St John of God Social Outreach services. Demand for this unique service grew quickly.

We ran a fundraising campaign that raised over **\$1 million** in donations from philanthropists (including our patron, the late Frank Costa), local businesses, events, and donations from the community. This enabled us to grow and build Horizon Houses across Victoria, and the program eventually expanded into Western Australia as well. It was a lot of hard work getting it up and running, but I feel incredibly proud of what we achieved, and to see young people empowered to flourish through Horizon House is extremely rewarding.

I eventually left the Foundation team and started working as a project manager for various building redevelopments at the hospital - but there was always more fundraising to be done. In my time as Director of Community Development, then Director of Hospital Redevelopments, right through to my current role as Director of Corporate & Service Development, I've overseen many more fundraising campaigns and witnessed how community donations have helped to build the St John of God Geelong Hospital we see today - from significant refurbishments in Day Oncology and Special Care Nursery, extra beds in the Emergency Department, to the latest medical equipment and technology.

I remember one man, Barry Bell, who was treated for cancer at our hospital and decided that he wanted to raise funds to help



other patients going through cancer treatment. Barry inspired the development of a new day oncology centre for Geelong, which has completely transformed the way we provide cancer care to our community. To see Barry's face when we officially opened the centre – 100% built on community donations - was something I'll never forget. Barry has sadly passed away now, but his family still talk about that day. That was a significant moment for all of us.

To just say 'thank you' to donors feels too obvious... but I am forever grateful for the fact that people in our community have been moved and reached out to help others.

Donations really do make a genuine, tangible difference to people's lives.

Money is one thing, but seeing the difference a gift makes to people who need help is something else.

Donations fund **game-changing** technology for patients

Recent statistics show that over 2,000 Australians are diagnosed with a type of brain cancer each year. To help meet the needs of people in our community who are facing a brain cancer diagnosis, St John of God Murdoch Hospital has recently invested in state-of-the-art neurosurgery equipment, including the LoopX Intraoperative CT, and upgrades to the hospital's Brainlab System.

Now, thanks to the support of generous donors, the hospital has been able to purchase a Cranial Ultrasound Probe that provides active imaging for neurosurgeons during surgery. By enabling neurosurgeons to visualise the tumours in real time during surgery, there is greater scope to achieve outcomes for the patient efficiently and safely. It significantly increases the likelihood of surgeons achieving complete tumour resection and therefore greatly improves the prognosis for the patient.

Importantly, this technology has the benefit of more accurately identifying and removing the tumour without removing unnecessary tissue or causing any damage to surrounding healthy tissue in the brain. The cranial ultrasound also reduces the overall time the patient spends under anaesthetic.

St John of God Murdoch Hospital is the first adult hospital in WA to use this state-of-the-art ultrasound probe integrated with Brainlab navigation technology, and we are proud to be leading the way in health care excellence and positive patient outcomes for people with brain cancer.

We are so grateful to Sue Roberts, Galvin Engineering and The James Galvin Foundation for funding the cranial ultrasound probe. Their generosity will make a huge impact for countless patients and their families.

A new lease on life, thanks to a **Gift of Hope**

A Gift of Hope is a gift of financial support provided to people with life-threatening conditions such as cancer. For patients who might be struggling to afford the best treatment for their cancer, a donor-funded Gift of Hope can be life-changing.

In late 2021, Judith Foster, a mother and grandmother who had dedicated nearly 40 years to a career as a nurse and midwife, found herself facing a lung cancer diagnosis - despite never having smoked in her life.

"I think I just felt like the whole world was falling apart," says Judith of receiving her diagnosis.

"I suddenly thought, I'm not going to be around for my son. I need to be here for my family – and for my patients. It's a really awful time, I just wanted to be well, to be working."

When Judith's initial medication stopped working, St John of God Subiaco Hospital Oncologist, Adjunct Associate Professor Tim Clay, suggested a new diagnostic test.

The special molecular test, which would look closely at tumour DNA, would enable Adj A/Prof Clay to determine the best treatment for Judith's cancer. Unfortunately, as is often the case with new cancer treatments and tests, the molecular test was not covered under Medicare or private health insurance.

This is where a Gift of Hope came in. Adj A/Prof Clay had seen firsthand how a

Gift of Hope could help patients like Judith to access treatments that might otherwise be out of reach, bringing hope when patients may have exhausted all other treatment options.

"Without a Gift of Hope, Judith may not have been able to access molecular testing," says Adj A/Prof Clay.

"This testing allowed us then to apply for and receive compassionate access to a therapy that is not funded in Australia via compassionate means from a major pharmaceutical company. She has just had her first assessment to show her new treatment is working."

Judith says the testing, and subsequent treatment, has been life-changing.

"I have a new lease on life, and the turning point was the Gift of Hope," she says. which I didn't think I would have. I saw my son get married, I have a new daughter-in-law, and a beautiful grandson.

"Now that I'm not working, I babysit two or three times a week, and I probably would not have had that. So I'm very lucky."

Judith said she felt extremely grateful to Adj A/Prof Clay for 'being on the ball', and advocating for her treatment, but also to the donors like you who had made the Gift of Hope possible.

"Saying thanks is not really enough," Judith said.

"They are very generous, caring people – and I hope they know that they are making a big difference to people like me. I'm really grateful."

Using the healing power of nature for better mental health and wellbeing

For more than 15 years,
St John of God Health Care
has provided mental health
services in Melbourne's South
East, including comprehensive
treatment and care to inpatients,
day patients, community-based
patients and outpatients as
well as psychiatric health care
for acute mental health and
addiction conditions.

Research tells us that our mental health and wellbeing improves when we have access to support and services close to home, and we pride ourselves on providing a high standard of care at the St John of God Langmore Centre in Berwick.

Many of us have experienced how spending time in natural environments helps to reduce our stress and lift our mood. Thanks to generous donor support, the Langmore Centre has been able to establish new sensory gardens for use by patients and loved ones.

The new garden is designed to stimulate all the five senses and provide an opportunity for conversation, meditation and activities between patients, therapists and visitors in a tranquil outdoor setting. Research tells us that sensory gardens can make a great contribution to emotional and physical health by enhancing communication, mood and awareness.

Donor support has enabled two dedicated sensory garden spaces to be created at the Langmore Centre: one more secluded for therapeutic activities to take place, and another, more public, space for everyone to enjoy.

Julian Woods, Exercise
Physiologist at St John of God
Langmore Centre, says the
spaces have already been put
to good use by caregivers and
patients.

"Facilitator-guided Gardening Groups are running weekly for one hour, and are providing current inpatients the opportunity to develop and maintain our courtyard 'Sensory Garden'," Julian said.

"To date we've planted seedlings, seeds, cuttings, and mature plants of summer fruiting berries, salad greens, herbs, vegetables, and flowers. Our efforts have also provided strawberry, mint, tomato, cucumber, zucchini, and other herb plants for caregivers, patients and their families to take home."

Julian also says he can see significant benefits for patients engaging in the sensory garden spaces.

"I'm finding it most lovely to see patients that struggle to engage in other forms of therapy really coming out of their shell in the garden space."

We are so grateful to our wonderful donors for their support for these beautiful garden spaces. You have made such an amazing difference to caregivers, patients, and their loved ones at St John of God Langmore Centre.

Donor support bringing the very best care to sick kids across WA

St John of God Health Care has a proud reputation for delivering outstanding patient care and clinical excellence, and over the past three decades our supporters have played a critical role in enabling this world-class care.

For several years now we have had the honour to partner with Stan Perron Charitable Foundation, an organisation synonymous with philanthropy and well known for making a positive contribution to Western Australian communities.

In 2024, Stan Perron Charitable Foundation has generously provided funding for several vital pieces of equipment at hospitals across WA that will help to deliver the very best care for vulnerable babies and children.

- At St John of God Midland Hospital. Stan Perron. Charitable Foundation has contributed to the purchase of a new Video Laryngoscope. This piece of equipment is used to help visualise the airways of tiny neonatal babies, and is crucial for enabling caregivers to more safely and easily insert breathing tubes.
- Also at Midland. the Airvo3 has been funded to support paediatric patients in respiratoru distress, by improving oxygenation, helping the little ones to breathe easier and enhancing their overall comfort.
- A Giraffe Incubator Care Station has been funded for St John of God Subiaco Hospital, new technology which will help to monitor and support the health and development of fragile infants.

environment in the hospital's neonatal foster a close bond between them and their families while they are in hospital.

- To help reduce distress and discomfort when locating veins on children, an AccuVein Finder has been funded for **St John of God Murdoch** Hospital's paediatric ward. This equipment will help clinicians to more quickly, safely and accurately locate veins on the child and reduce the child's anxiety.
- Stan Perron Charitable Foundation's generositu also extends beyond the Perth metropolitan area, with support for state-of-the-art equipment at St John of God Bunbury Hospital. A new paediatric Ear, Nose, and Throat (ENT) endoscope will enhance the hospital's existing ENT service, making care closer to home a reality for children in the South West, and meaning families will be less likely to have to travel to Perth for surgery.

We are truly grateful to the Stan Perron Charitable Foundation for their compassion and ongoing commitment to ensuring better health outcomes for our communities. Their kindness will be felt by children and families far and wide across WA, for many years to come.
