What's on your mind?

A quick-fire Q&A with our CEO, Bianca Pietralla

Q. Looking back to 2022, what were your biggest highlights?

A: There are so many to list, but one that really resonated with me last year was the outcome of the Cuddle Beds campaign. What started as a simple, meaningful idea from a palliative care nursing caregiver on the frontline at one of our WA hospitals, evolved into getting these special beds into 12 St John of God Hospitals across Victoria and Western Australia, with the enduring support of our community. This initiative really speaks to our values at St John of God Health Care, and how we emphasise compassionate care during some of the most difficult times for patients and their loved ones.

I was also really thrilled to launch our inaugural St John of God Foundation Research Grants to fund an early career researcher as well as seed funding for two projects. Medical research is so important in leading to new discoveries and ensuring patients receive the best care possible.

Chances are, if you have a treatment today that wasn't available ten years ago, someone with the knowledge and skills had the foresight to research a question like. "Will treatment A have better outcomes than treatment B?"

That idea of being able to explore new frontiers that have potentially life-changing impacts in health care really excites me. Similarly, the support for researchers to build capacity for systemic change. and to retain this talent in our communities is critical.

0. What's on the horizon for St John of God Foundation in 2023?

A. As always, there is a lot happening!

We've recently welcomed new members to the Foundation Board – Bryan Pyne and Tina Chinery, and I'm excited to work closely with them, and our existing board members, to ensure maximum impact for the communities we serve.

We are also embarking on a new strategic plan to maximise our impact and, in the meantime, will continue to focus on funding areas of unmet need in advancing personalised patient treatments and leading medical research.

0. What do you think are the biggest challenges facing the health care sector right now?

A. Without a doubt, the biggest challenge currently facing health care providers is staffing shortages on a global scale. Added to this, we are an ageing population and we are living longer, so I think another

challenge post-pandemic is how we 'live well' as a society.

More than one in five Australians over the age of 65 reported suffering two or more long term health conditions in the 2021 Census. If we can do more as a sector to prevent, treat and cure chronic disease. and to provide equitable and inclusive services to those most at risk or disadvantaged, we will continue to improve health outcomes and health equity.

Q. Could you tell us one thing you love about your job?

A. If I had to pick just one thing, I'd say the people! I consider myself very blessed to be able to call my team and all the amazing caregivers in our hospitals and services my colleagues, and I love working with our donors, corporate partners and community members. We're all united with the same goal - to make a difference.

Why I Give

We are so very fortunate to have kind and compassionate donors who care deeply about giving back to their communities, and love to hear the stories behind what inspires them to give.

We asked Ashby Farrell, donor and owner of Whitearch, to share his story.

For entrepreneur Ashby Farrell, the definition of success is being able to help others. After starting his own real estate business Whitearch, Ashby found he had the capacity to give back to his community in a way he hadn't before. "When I started Whitearch, I knew I wanted the business to have a strong social conscience." And so, in 2022 Ashby announced that Whitearch would donate 3.5% of every commission to St John of God Foundation's Gifts of Hope program, which provides direct financial support for people struggling with the cost of cancer treatment.

Ashby felt especially drawn to Gifts of Hope because in his professional life he has seen first-hand the financial impact that a cancer diagnosis can have on families.

"I often see people that are distressed and trying to sell their home because of the cost of their cancer treatment, or they're struggling to buy a house because of the financial burden of their cancer treatment," says Ashby.

"Research and trying to find a cure is important, but the immediate financial pain that people go through, in order to receive life-saving cancer treatment, can be immense.

"To know that Gifts of Hope will financially help some patients and their families, when they need it most, is something I am very proud to be part of".

Born at St John of God Subiaco Hospital and raised in Perth, Ashby has deep roots in his local community - especially since opening his own business in December of 2021. As a young man, he was actively involved in community sports, coaching and volunteering for local clubs, which reinforced for him the importance of being part of something bigger.

For Ashby, cancer is a cause close to his heart.

"Sadly I think everyone has been affected by cancer in some way," says Ashby.

New Subiaco clinic helps patients find wellness after breast cancer

Breast cancer is the second most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australia, affecting both men and women. Fortunately though, the survival rate for breast cancer has greatly improved in the past few decades - from 76% in 1989, to 93% for women and 86% for men today.

With this increase in survivorship, comes an increased need for continued support for people who have finished their treatment and recovered from their cancer.

St John of God Subiaco Hospital Breast Care Nurse, Gay Refeld, says that she often sees patients struggle emotionally whilst coping with their diagnosis and treatment, and beyond.

"Once their active treatment is completed (surgery, chemotherapy and radiotherapy), there is a perception that life will return to normal," says Gay.

"However, life after breast cancer is a 'new' normal."

After finishing treatment, survivors can experience feelings of anxiety, worry about cancer returning, impacts on relationships, and fatigue. In addition, survivors may have ongoing financial stresses relating to loss of income due to inability to work during treatment, gap payments and ongoing medical costs such as medication and physiotherapy.

To help meet the needs of survivors, a new clinic has been established at St John of God Subiaco Hospital: The Wellness After Breast Cancer Clinic. The Clinic offers a holistic consult, where patients have an opportunity to discuss their physical and psychological symptoms with a dedicated Breast Care Nurse. It also serves to normalise patients' feelings, address ongoing issues, and to offer advice and referrals to relevant services. The consult is documented in an individualised Wellness Plan, and then provided to the patient and health professionals involved in their care. ▼ The words of patients who have received care at the Wellness After Breast Cancer Clinic:

"I found this appointment to be vital to my moving on to a normal life. It was closure in a way. By summarising the events of the past year, the Breast Care Nurse enabled me to understand where I am and what I have to do to continue to move forward."

"I felt like I could move on and open the door to the new normal with more enthusiasm and support!"

From Gay's perspective, the Clinic can be as rewarding for caregivers as it is for their patients.

"It's a privilege having the opportunity to spend quality time with patients, to reflect on their breast cancer diagnosis and address all issues experienced following their treatment. To see the relief on their faces and to validate that what they are experiencing is normal is very gratifying," sous Gou.

"Knowing that the clinic is making a difference in the quality of their lives and assisting them to move forward is very rewarding. My only wish is that I had the opportunity to see more patients in this setting."

We will continue to keep you updated on our work in support of breast cancer patients and their families. Please contact us on 1800 281 288 if you would like to support this vital area of care. "This is an essential part of the after care service... it ties up loose ends or gives you time to address issues you didn't feel were important at the time of treatment. Like with myself, the aftercare was required because it addressed a new set of health issues that I had left unattended, because I felt like I'd been through enough with my breast cancer treatment."

New technology transforming breast cancer surgery

Donor funding helps breast cancer patients to access state-of-the-art equipment at St John of God Murdoch Hospital

Thanks to generous donor support, St John of God Murdoch Hospital surgeons will be able to deliver exceptional, personalised treatment for patients with breast cancer.

Support from our donor community has enabled the purchase of the Trident HD system for intra-operative radiography. The Trident is an advanced, portable intra-operative breast specimen system that allows surgeons to take images of breast tumour specimens in the operating theatre, in real time, and determine whether a clean margin between cancerous tumours and healthy tissue has been achieved.

"The Trident HD system is a breakthrough in breast specimen imaging technology. It is the only specimen radiograph on the market to use the same detector technology used in 3 dimension mammography systems to generate crisp, clear, high-resolution images, helping to streamline workflows and reduce recalls while decreasing procedure times," says Dr Saud Hamza, Breast Surgeon at St John of God Murdoch Hospital.

"It features an ergonomic design that makes it easy to manoeuvre in a crowded operating theatre and it does have an intuitive touchscreen interface and wireless integration supports, making it the most advanced specimen radiograph in the market."

The impact of this ground-breaking technology will be profoundly felt by patients and their families. By shortening the time of each surgery and reducing patients' time in the operating theatre and under anaesthesia, this technology has the potential to greatly improve patients' wellbeing. By helping patients to feel more confident that the cancer has been removed, and eliminating the stress of additional surgery, the Trident can also put patients on the road to recovery sooner.

"This equipment will enable St John of God Murdoch Hospital to offer those undergoing breast cancer surgery a more precise surgery, and reduced likelihood of subsequent surgeries," says Ben Edwards, CEO St John of God Murdoch Hospital.

"This innovative state-of-the-art technology creates lower risk for patients because less time is spent in the operating theatre. This reduces potential risks associated with anaesthetic, infection and bleeding."

Mary's lasting legacy

Complex spinal surgery made possible through the kindness of one Berwick local

St John of God Berwick Hospital has been a crucial service for people in the local area for over 110 years, and with thanks to kind people in our community, will continue to provide exceptional care for many years to come.

One such person was Mary Helen Seath. Mary was born in Koo Wee Rup, VIC, to Scottish parents in 1930. She had an older brother Jimmy, and the family lived on a dairy farm until the floods of 1937, when they moved to Doveton. Shortly after, Mary's father returned to Scotland, leaving Mary's mother to raise her two children singlehandedly. Mary's mother was resourceful, hard-working and scrupulous in her business dealings, and in 1954, they were able to build a family home on a 7.5 acre block in Hallam. This became Mary's home and sanctuary until she died in 2019.



"Mary was a loving and doting daughter and sister, and as a friend, she was kind, generous, and loval," say Mary's friends, Julianne Vermeend and Dianne Taylor.

"She devoted many years of her life to the care of her aging mother, who was 94 when she died. After that, Mary's greatest joy was her garden.

"Mary and her mother created the garden together, perhaps it's one of the reasons why it provided such solace for her in later years. It was both a beautiful and functional garden, with flowers, bulbs, succulents, shrubs, trees, as well as a thriving vegetable patch and prolifically fruiting trees. Even with debilitating arthritis, Mary would hand pick the fruit and vegetables, stew fruit to give to friends, make jam and eat her home-grown vegetables daily.

"She was a resilient, fiercely independent woman who lived a simple and mostly solitary life, and who was loved and respected by the handful of people she held dear."

Before her passing, Mary's mother had expressed a wish to leave a bequest to the local hospital – which Mary eventually did, in her mother's honour.

"The Berwick and District Bush Nursing Hospital cared for Mary and her family throughout their lives, and Mary was incredibly grateful for the treatment they received over the years. She wanted that legacy to continue for her community, and to honour her mother's wishes," say Julianne and Dianne.

"We know how delighted Mary and her family would be that their generous donation will help so many patients at St John of God Berwick in the future."

Mary's kind gift has made it possible for St John of God Berwick Hospital to invest in state-of-the-art technology that will enable surgeons to undertake complex spinal surgery.

Mr David Oehme, a neurosurgeon at St John of God Berwick Hospital, says the new equipment means patients can access the very best care closer to home.

"Prior to the purchase of the 3-D Ziehm C-arm, Brainlab Navigation System and Mackey operating table, any patient requiring complex instrumented spine surgery, particularly fusion surgery, was transferred to major inner city hospitals for the surgery," says Mr Oehme.

"Previously patients would spend time in hospital away from family. Now they can have their surgery close to home and their families, and still receive state-of-the art care. Patients can have their consultations. surgery and rehab all locally in Berwick at St John of God."

Mr Oehme also says the equipment has ensured that complex surgeries can be performed more safely and with greater precision.

"It has made a major difference to patients in the wider Berwick community who can now access complex spine surgery safely with state-of-the-art neuronavigation equipment. This has been appreciated already by many patients and their families."

"This technology allows for greater safety of instrumentation of the spine. Our first surgery was like a dream. The screws were flawless. The patient coped very well and overall the equipment worked perfectly," Mr Oehme says.

"The new equipment brings St John of God Berwick Hospital into line with other major inner city hospitals with having state-of-theart spinal neuronavigation equipment, and has upskilled our nursing staff who are now proficient in using spinal instrumentation and neuronavigation instruments."

Mr Oehme expressed his gratitude on behalf of patients and their families for the generosity that has allowed the hospital to invest in the cutting-edge equipment.


