

RESEARCH:

Translational research from bench to bedside

We can only discover tomorrow's medical treatments and health care by undertaking research today. St John of God Health Care is actively involved in research across a range of clinical fields with support from our community and other key collaborators.

With generous community support, the Bendat Respiratory Research and Development (BRRD) Group is at the forefront of world leading medical research into respiratory medicine and respiratory oncology.

Professor Eli Gabbay chairs the BRRD research group, made up of five consultants, two nurses, two research fellows and a statistician.

The group aims to better understand lung and respiratory disease in order to develop advanced treatments through translational research.

"Thanks to generous donor support, the Bendat Respiratory Research and Development Group is at the forefront of thoracic research. With continued support, we can continue to make new medical discoveries to improve health outcomes for our patients and the greater community" said Professor Eli Gabbay, Chair, BRRD Fund Committee.

Over the past 12 months, the BRRD group has achieved several key milestones, including:

- Continuation of the Thoracic Cancer Biobank, a collection of biological samples (e.g. blood) and health data that supports researchers to make meaningful discoveries. As more information is added, the Biobank serves as a 'library' providing deeper insights for ongoing research and advanced discoveries.
- Publication of important research findings in several high impact international journals including *Internal Journal of Medicine* and *Pulmonary Circulation*
- Presentation of research findings at national and international conferences
- Mentoring of junior doctors in their research careers
- Directly improving patient care for patients with lung disease and cancer

The research group collaborates with sites across WA, as well as nationally and internationally, and a monthly journal club has been established to ensure physicians are kept up to date with the latest respiratory research.

110 years of health care in Berwick

On March 23rd 1910, Dr Percy Langmore and Nurse Grace Dunphy signed the registration of application for a private hospital in Berwick. The little hospital, known as Shepton Private Hospital, run from a tiny weatherboard house at Station Street was the beginning of today's St John of God Berwick Hospital.

St John of God Health Care took over ownership and management of the Berwick Hospital in 2003, inheriting its rich history. A major redevelopment to offer new and expanded services to meet growing demand in the region commenced in 2016, with the new St John of God Berwick Hospital opening on Kangan Drive in 2018 with all patients seamlessly and safely transferred from the former Gibb Street Hospital.

Through fundraising and philanthropy, the Berwick community got behind the redevelopment and contributed an incredible \$2.8M towards Comprehensive Cardiac and Cancer Care services at the new state-of-the-art hospital. These services support advanced care and increased capacity, technology and facilities, offering the community the very best treatment options which can increase the life expectancy and quality of life of many community members.

The community continues to support advanced cardiac and cancer care at the hospital to help provide care closer to home for patients in the Casey and Cardinia regions.

In response to the escalating COVID-19 situation in Victoria recently the original hospital facility was rapidly stood up in August to offer the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) additional beds to help protect the aged care sector, who have been hardest hit by this pandemic.

The vision for 2020 and beyond includes a redevelopment of the original hospital site to provide care for patients with mental health conditions in response to a 2019 community engagement campaign. The centre will be named St John of God Langmore Centre in honour of Dr Percy Langmore and his son Dr Leonard Langmore for their contribution to health care services in the region.

IMPACT:

Sean celebrates 10 years of survival

In March 2010, 38-year-old Sean Mahony received the devastating news that he had stage four bowel cancer which had spread to his liver. With this news, Sean's biggest fear was not getting to see his three young children, then aged 8, 6 and 4, grow up.

Sean immediately began treatment at the Bendat Family Comprehensive Cancer Centre (BFCCC) and defying all odds, he has now celebrated 10 years of survival this year, after receiving over 250 rounds of chemotherapy at the BFCCC.

The BFCCC was established in 2007 through community support to provide comprehensive cancer care, allowing patients to access all the services and support they need, for all cancer types, at one location.

Sean continues to receive treatment at the BFCCC every two weeks and said,

“The nurses are like my family now, which makes my treatment days feel more like a social outing, rather than a medical appointment”.

Sean praises his forward-thinking medical team, including oncologist Dr Tom van Hagen, who has treated him since his initial diagnosis. *“Dr van Hagen is constantly exploring the latest research and treatment advancements to ensure that I continue to live a good quality of life.”*

Philanthropic support enhances our hospitals' ability to invest in health and medical research to ensure patients like Sean have the best chance for survival.

Sean is optimistic about the future. *“The longer you stay alive, the more treatment options are available. I hope to stay ahead of the curve and maybe one day there will be a cure.”*

Most of all, Sean is grateful to spend time with his family and see his children become young adults.

We would like to thank our donors for their ongoing commitment to supporting leading medical research to help cancer patients like Sean to access the best possible treatment options and live longer, fulfilling lives.

LEADING THE WAY:

Connection and comfort when it is needed most

Large patient beds, referred to warmly as 'Cuddle Beds,' can make a huge difference for palliative care patients and their families. Cuddle Beds allow loved ones to be physically close and lay together, deepening connection and providing comfort.

This compassionate approach to care can have a huge impact on patients who can often feel isolated, and provides family members with the opportunity to feel close in a hospital or hospice setting.

St John of God Murdoch Hospital is leading the way in Western Australia with this approach to care, being the first hospital to offer patients a Cuddle Bed during end-of-life care.

Karan Lane, a Nurse Unit Manager in the Oncology Ward at Murdoch Hospital, has been the driving force behind the Cuddle Bed project.

When Karan's own mother passed away seven years ago, she longed for more meaningful, intimate connection during this time, so when she later discovered the use of larger hospital beds that could fit two or more people, she encouraged this style of care be adopted.

“As a caregiver I see it time and time again, where people are trying to get close to each other, and it can be heartbreaking and have a lasting effect for patients' families. It's about just being there... without restriction.”

Together with your support, the Foundation aims to fund additional Cuddle Beds to offer more palliative patients at Murdoch Hospital this meaningful approach to care.

Subiaco Hospital performs 100th transcatheter aortic valve implantation (TAVI)

In addition to saving the life of 86-year-old cardiac patient Irene Thomas, the operation marked the 100th procedure conducted by St John of God Subiaco Hospital's TAVI Team. TAVI is a minimally invasive surgery which enables suitable patients with aortic stenosis, a narrowing of the aortic valve, to avoid traditional open heart surgery and benefit from a quicker recovery and less discomfort.



Our very first Intraoperative Radiation Therapy (IORT) treatment

The first Intraoperative Radiation Therapy treatment was performed at a private hospital in Australia this year thanks to our generous community. The advanced technology supports significantly reduced treatment time for suitable breast cancer patients through a single, targeted dose of radiology during surgery. *"It's made a real difference for me at a time when being with loved ones is more important than ever"* - Debra Strauss, our first-ever IORT patient.



A first in Bunbury for advanced cardiac care

State-of-the-art cardiac imaging technology is now in use at St John of God Bunbury Hospital. The new technology provides comprehensive images enabling doctors to see the inner mechanisms of the heart and blood flow in real time, empowering specialists to make more effective surgical decisions.

Cardiologist Dr Stefan Buchholz said, *"The technology allows us to visualise the shape of heart valves before going into surgery, so that we can plan whether an affected valve can be repaired or needs to be replaced ahead of time"*.

It is the first time this technology has been available in WA's South West, saving patients the travel to Perth for this specialised care.
