Again, thank you so much for your ongoing support – it makes a very real difference, every single day.



### In October, caregivers at St John of God Bunbury Hospital hosted the 'All That Glitters Is Gold' Gala Ball, a glamorous night of dressing up and dancing for a good cause.

The annual ball raised over \$20,000, with guests invited to take part in a number of fundraising activities. For the first time, the Ball included a wall of 100 glasses of champagne - 99 of which contained a cubic zirconia gem, and one which contained a genuine diamond. Guests could purchase a glass of champagne for a donation of \$100 for their chance to win the diamond. # Life-changing equipment for Ballarat Emergency Department

#### The Oliver family has had a deep connection to the Ballarat community for over 100 years.

For generations, their family business has manufactured safety footwear for people from all walks of life - from boots for local goldminers in the late 1800s, to modern personal protective equipment (PPE) for workers all over the world.

The Oliver family has always been active members of the local community, and passionate supporters of local organisations, including hospitals. In 2021, they provided generous philanthropic support to St John of God Ballarat Hospital, which enabled the purchase of an innovative new mobile ultrasound machine for the Emergency Department (ED).

With the ED experiencing increasing demand on a daily basis, this new machine allows emergency physicians to perform ultrasounds on patients in real time. The machine allows for more sophisticated diagnostic testing for a range of conditions – from severe trauma, to cardiac conditions, to issues during pregnancy. The machine also means patients can be treated more quickly, and may even decrease the amount of time patients are required to stay in ED. This has a flow on effect to ED wait times, so more patients can been seen in a shorter period of time.

"It was great to see the ultrasound machine and to hear about how valuable it has been for the Emergency Department, and for the patients who have been treated using this machine," said Andrew Oliver, of the Oliver Family Foundation.

We are exceptionally grateful that our community is made up of compassionate individuals and philanthropic leaders like the Oliver Family, and we thank them for their generous support.

## Bringing hope to critically ill patients

For patients like Felicity\*, being diagnosed with a life-threatening condition like cancer can be made even more distressing by the sometimes prohibitive cost of accessing treatments not covered by health insurance or pharmaceutical benefits schemes.

New medical discoveries, including drugs and specialised equipment, can help patients to live longer and to experience less pain or other debilitating symptoms. However, these treatments can often be costly and out of reach of many Australians, especially if they are facing personal challenges in addition to their illness.

Felicity, who is undergoing treatment for pancreatic cancer, also has a 12 year old son to care for. Her husband has a serious disability following a sudden cerebral haemorrhage, and they have no other family in the state to help them out. For families like Felicity's, a Gift of Hope can be life-changing.

A Gift of Hope is a gift of financial support provided to in-need Australians suffering from a lifethreatening condition, such as cancer. This Gift directly supports patients like Felicity in their time of greatest need.

Dr Andrew Dean, Head of the Medical Oncology Department at St John of God Subiaco Hospital, is a leader in oncology care and research. Dr Dean also regularly participates in international clinical trials and continues to be a major contributor to pancreatic, lung and ovarian cancer studies. He has also seen firsthand the difference a Gift of Hope can make to someone like Felicity. "

Thanks to a Gift of Hope, she has been able to access advanced care. It allowed her to receive a new, unfunded treatment that she may not have had access to otherwise."

"The meaningful and intimate connection that can be given to critically ill patients with these beds is an immeasurable gift, and can help to remove physical barriers for loved ones during end of life care."



Patients in palliative care can often feel a sense of isolation, even when their loved ones are nearby.

'Cuddle Beds' are special hospital beds that can be converted to support two or more people, allowing more connection with lovedones during end of life care. These simple yet profoundly impactful beds allow families to be as close as possible, and lay together during the precious last days of their loved one's life.

In a first for WA, St John of God Murdoch Hospital was one of the first health care providers in Australia to offer a Cuddle Bed to patients in palliative care.

By raising funds to support Cuddle Beds in St John of God Health Care hospitals, we hope



to ensure that we can offer this level of care and comfort to as many palliative patients as possible.

With this in mind, we are so very pleased to provide the latest update on our fundraising efforts for Cuddle Beds. Thanks to the generosity of our community, Cuddle Bed trials have been underway in eight St John of God Health Care hospitals in recent months.

The feedback from caregivers overseeing the beds in use has been overwhelmingly supportive.


# Supporting ground-breaking research at St John of God Murdoch Hospital

High quality data collection is fundamental to successful clinical trials. Accurate data helps to optimise trial outcomes, improves safety for patients receiving new and potentially experimental therapies, and supports the development of treatments which will help many patients now and into the future.

Thanks to donations from the community, a state-of-the-art electrocardiograph (ECG) machine and vital signs monitor, have recently been purchased for St John of God Murdoch Hospital. This equipment will be dedicated to patients participating in ground-breaking oncology clinical trials conducted by researchers at St John of God Murdoch Hospital and across the globe.

As an example, St John of God Murdoch Hospital was recently involved in a global trial of a cancer drug that can double the disease-free survival time in patients with oesophageal cancer. The drug, which is already approved for other cancers such as Hodgkin's lymphoma, melanoma and kidney cancer, gives hope for people with early-stage oesophageal cancer to be able to live cancer-free for longer. St John of God Murdoch Hospital's Head of Cancer Services, Associate Professor Kynan Feeney, said it was hoped the drug would become the new standard of care. With the new donor-funded equipment, researchers like A/Prof. Feeney and his team will be able to ensure consistency of data collection, and adherence to the often strict time points required for clinical trials. Patients' records can also be stored on the devices, allowing real-time monitoring for any trends or changes in their health, so that caregivers can optimise the care they provide whilst the patients are participating in clinical research.

The new equipment will also broaden the scope of clinical trials offered at St John of God Murdoch Hospital, providing patients with access to new and innovative treatments that otherwise would not have been available. On behalf of patients, researchers and caregivers at St John of God Murdoch Hospital, thank you to our amazing community for making safe and innovative research a reality.



## Mental health care closer to home

St John of God Health Care is proud to be expanding its mental health services with the reopening of the St John of God Langmore Centre. The redeveloped, state-of-the-art centre is expected to open in mid-2022, and will offer the latest evidence-based therapies to help people living with mental health issues.

Even before the pandemic, the demand for mental health services was increasing, so now more than ever the Centre will play a vital role in supporting better community health outcomes.

"One in five Australians live with a mental health condition," says Linda Allen, CEO of the Langmore Centre.

"It is quite possible that someone in our family, a neighbour or someone we know at the local sports club, the local school, or working with us is affected." Some of the most common mental health conditions include anxiety, depression, and addiction issues, all of which can be debilitating and affect people from all walks of life.

For a person struggling with their mental health, their condition may be exacerbated by having difficulty accessing help when they need it. This can also place additional pressure on loved ones caring for the person experiencing issues.

"It is important that people are able to access and be provided with the right support close to home, in order to focus on improving their quality of life," says Linda.

Research also shows that patients are more likely to respond better to treatment and have a sustained recovery when they have access to early intervention mental health services close to home.

The St John of God Langmore Centre will be located in Berwick and will service the fast-growing South East corridor of Melbourne, providing a specialist community mental health service with both inpatient and outpatient services.
